













Ranking of Poker Hands

	<p>Royal Flush The five highest cards, the 10 through the Ace, all five of the same suit. A royal flush is actually an ace-high straight flush. Two people with royal flushes would tie.</p>
	<p>Straight Flush A Straight Flush is comprised of five cards in numerical order, all of the same suit. It's not allowed to "wrap around," such as Q-K-A-2-3.</p>
	<p>Four of a Kind Four cards of the same denomination, the fifth card is irrelevant.</p>
	<p>Full House Any three cards of the same denomination, plus any pair of a different denomination. Ties are broken by the three of a kind.</p>
	<p>Flush Any five non-consecutive cards of the same suit. In a tie, whoever has the highest ranking card wins.</p>
	<p>Straight Any five consecutive cards of mixed suits. Ace can be high or low but a Straight cannot "wrap around." In a tie, the Straight that goes to a higher ranking card wins.</p>
	<p>Three of a Kind Three cards of the same denomination. The example shows three of a kind, eights.</p>
	<p>Two Pair Any two cards of the same denomination, plus another two cards of the same denomination. If both hands have the same high pair, the second pair wins.</p>
	<p>Pair Any two cards of the same denomination. Our example displays a pair of queens. In a tie, the high card wins.</p>
	<p>High Card If no other hand is achieved, the highest card held wins. In the example, the ace of hearts is the high card. In the case of a tie, you move to the next highest card and so on.</p>
